What is character development?

"Character education can encompass a wide range of curricular and extra- curricular activities, including: subject lessons, dedicated character development education lessons, assemblies, sports, performance arts clubs, outward bound activities, hobby clubs, and subject learning clubs. These opportunities help young people to explore and express their character and build the skills they need for resilience, empathy and employability."

School Ethos

Leaders have established a pervasive ethos of high expectations of behaviour towards others in the school community, underpinned by clearly understood and shared values - love, care and compassion for others. At St. Thomas of Canterbury children are given multiple opportunities to understand the value of hard work, effort and determination. The link between hard work and success is made explicit and celebrated by all school staff. Success through hard work is praised and rewarded: within every classroom, at assemblies and prizegiving presentations.

Challenging curriculum

School leaders have designed an ambitious, high challenge curriculum that has been carefully designed and sequenced to enable pupils to enjoy success through hard work and resilience, as they make progress mastering rigorous key content.

Pedagogical approaches, like the use of Growth Mindset "learning powers" support the pupils' learning of this challenging curriculum.

Extra-curricular provision

Alongside the school's ethos and taught curriculum, there is strong provision for extracurricular activities. The programme is designed to focus on high quality activities across a wide spectrum of different domains - musical, sporting, cultural, creative, service to others, volunteering etc. These enable pupils to participate over time, learn and improve in their chosen activities, and to compete or perform, as appropriate.

The participation of the least advantaged and most vulnerable groups of pupils is fundamental to our inclusive approach. Possible barriers to participation, like cost or family circumstance, are understood by school leaders and proactively addressed to maximise participation.

Some extra-curricular activities are specifically designed and targeted at identified groups causing concern, for example pre-school reading groups for disadvantaged pupils or additional sports club for more sedentary children.
