## Parent and Carer Information: KS1 History (Ages 5 - 7)

This guide helps you to track the progress of your year child as they develop through the subject of history. In years 1 - 2, children learn the key elements that form the basis of their history education, including significant historical events and their local history. Practising these skills at home can be a great way to your boost child's confidence and complement what they learn in the classroom. This guide outlines how you, as parents and carers, can best support your child's journey through history education with an easy-to-follow flowchart of what they will learn and clear goals for you to work on together.



Your child will learn about changes within living memory. This means they will explore the ways in which life has changed during the time of their parents, grandparents and great-grandparents.



Your child can think about about how transport has changed over the years by looking at key images of steam trains, early cars and bicycles and comparing them with their modern counterparts.



Explore your family's past and create your own family tree.



Discuss how toys have changed by looking at pictures and thinking about how materials and technology have all had an impact on the type of toys produced over the years.



Your child will learn about significant historical events, people and places in their own locality by studying the area that they live in.



How did the Victorians have an impact on the area you live in? Can your child spot any Victorian buildings? Compare Victorian and modern-day homes with this PowerPoint.



Discover how the First World War had an impact on the area you live in by visiting your local war memorial. Then, discover more facts with our First World War reading comprehension.







Find out whether your local area has links to the Romans, Saxons or Vikings by studying place names with our activity sheet.



Your child will learn about the lives of significant individuals in the past. This means that they will find out about people who have contributed to national and international achievements, such as Queen Elizabeth I and and Charles Darwin.



Neil Armstrong, an American astronaut, was the first man on the moon, but did you know Helen Sharman was the first British astronaut in space? Your child can find out more about Helen and her achievements in this reading comprehension.



Your child can find out about the life and work of Florence Nightingale with these fact files.



Be inspired by the story and beliefs of Nelson Mandela with this PowerPoint showcasing key photos and facts about his life and times.



Your child will learn about events beyond living memory. These are events further back in the past that have had a significant national or international impact and that are still remembered today through festivals or anniversaries, such as Remembrance Day.



Your child can make their own poppy and discuss the sacrifice and changes that result from wars using the photos and activities in this Remembrance Day Activity Pack.







Discover facts about the Great Fire of London with this reading comprehension activity which contains information about when the fire started and how it was tackled.
